MERCURY is a consortium of academic partners in Europe, China and South Africa, formed to examine the European Union's contribution to multilateralism. It is funded through the FP VII, and will run for 3 years from February 2009. It advances an intellectual agenda – to explore, explain, and evaluate different conceptions of multilateralism – but also seeks maximum, practical policy relevance. The EU has recognized the importance of multilateralism in both the 2003 European Security Strategy and Lisbon Treaty, and claims actively to promote multilateralism. MERCURY's primary research questions flow from this commitment:

- 1) how should we understand multilateralism, both historically and in contemporary terms?
- 2) does the EU live up to its ambitions to contribute to effective multilateralism?
- 3) what lessons can be drawn from Europe's experience of promoting multilateralism?

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
